Sarik Vacform had a lovely little 3D printer on display. It was making little models, this one is a small Castle, similar to a Chess piece. The astonishing thing is that the Castle is hollow and complete with a spiral staircase inside, just visible through the window. Now I know that the printer needs a computer programme to print but the printer was on sale for £300, it was a build it yourself from a kit version. This printer can print things about 4" across and 6" high, its not quick but it was quiet so you could leave it printing overnight. Interestingly, the printer had 3D printed parts in its own construction.



I can see a time where for example, you want some scale exhausts for your Mustang, you'll buy the programme that allows you to print your own. You'll pay and then download the programme, change the scale to match whatever size exhausts you want and then print them. Similarly, if you need a pilot, you buy the programme with the correct stye of pilot and print it yourself at whatever scale you wish. This printer pictured is very similar to the one on offer.

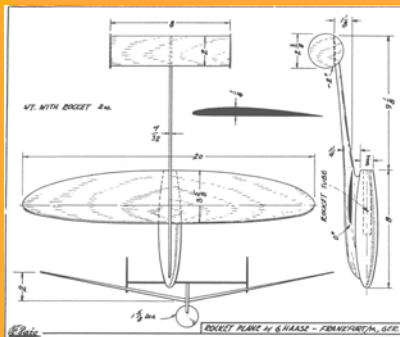
Indoor Flying Friday 11th September 19.30-21.30
