ONCE-DERELICT SUPER SIXTY FLIES AGAIN

Back at the beginning of 2003 a much modified and much battered "Super Sixty" model was rescued from the Harefield clubhouse, where it had been lying about for some time, having been donated to the club by

a departing member. All model aircraft freaks of a certain age have a lingering affection for this former freeflight design and one of them took pity on the sad remnants and vowed to restore them, and the project

dany of our more mature members will recognise this stripped down airframe as that



was featured in WLMAC's newsletter. Some comedian had added no less than twelve inches to the wingspan, installing a piece of fishing line between the wings, passed under the fuselage to take care of the increased bending force. The covering was fuel-proofed nylon, which took several evenings of extremely careful work to remove without breaking up the whole airframe. The wings were returned to



their original size. The fuselage was repaired and beefed up in the right places. A new stabiliser and elevator was built, though the original tail fin survived. It would have taken unacceptably brutal surgery to replace the tiny fuel tank, so it was left in place. The Super Sixty, now in its original, familiar form, resplendent in Cub Yellow Solartex and powered by an OS 46 LA two stroke is flying again at Harefield, capable of circling sedately on only a third of the available power from the OS. None of that hooligan prop hanging for this venerable piece of aero modelling history.
