Electric ducted fan enthusiast Frank Dalby Smith believes in balancing his DF fans, which turn at much greater speeds than anything to be found on an IC engine. Removed from its shroud, the fan is balanced with tiny drops of cyano, delivered to the base of the "light" blade. Call Frank for a balancing job on 01494 711365. but remember to remove the unit from your model first!

Aviation historian Arthur Creighton (on the right) chats to WLMAC member and former RAF Canberra pilot Lew Wrapson at the mid-February meeting. Creighton delivered a fascinating account of the American attempts to use remotely controlled Liberators and B17 Flying Fortresses, stripped down and packed with explosives, to attack German buzz bomb, rocket and long range gun sites aimed at London from France, Belgium and Holland. Most such attempts failed and many pilots, whose job it was to bail out after handing over radio control of their flying bombs to accompanying aircraft, were killed. Those early, disastrous attempts to perfect radio control of full sized aircraft were halted for fear of the Germans getting hold of the technology and the Americans didn't own up to it all until the nineteen sixties.
