# **CHANNEL 68 FREQUENCY ALERT**

On several occasions in recent weeks, an unknown R/C model has been seen flying under competent control, above the lakes that lie on low ground to the northwest of our flying field. At times the model has appeared above our tree line and thus easily visible from the clubhouse.

In spite of speaking to occupants of nearby flats and gardens on the Uxbridge/Rickmansworth Road, so far we have been unable to identify or contact the errant flyer or even to establish precisely the spot from which he controls his model.

The club's frequency monitor shows that he is using channel 68, which probably explains the loss



of control and subsequent crash recently experienced by committee member John Fowles who habitually uses that frequency. As a matter of urgency, if any member has information that could lead to identifying this pilot or just witnesses him flying, please telephone a committee member without delay as we need to trace him to reduce the risk of serious accident. It is not the committee's intention to wage war on this flyer, rather to advise him of the risk he runs and to cooperate with him, perhaps even by inviting him to join us.

In the meantime, members are advised not to use channel 68 unless the frequency monitor which is kept in the clubhouse is connected and clearly displays that channel 68 is not in use.

#### MODEL FLIGHT SIMULATORS

It's often quite hard to get enough 'stick time' when you're learning to fly models, especially in the winter. So how about using a simulator on your PC? There are plenty of commercial ones available, offering different levels of realism. None of them is quite like the real thing, of course, but they can be quite helpful in certain areas. One simulator that appeals to the pocket, is FMS. FMS is freeware.

That's right, it doesn't cost a bean except for the time online needed to download it.

FMS offers different aircraft, including

helicopters and gliders, and also different landscapes. It can be controlled via your keyboard (not recommended), a computer joystick (OK), or, via a home-built interface, from your transmitter.

The ground handling may not that realistic, but once airborne it's not bad at all. It shares the problem that all simulators have in that it's very hard to set up a landing approach, as you don't have the wide angle of view that you have in real life

Where it can prove very useful is helping you get to grips with orientation and 'wrong sticking' and, of course, crashing a simulation is not nearly as painful as crashing the real thing. Why not give it a try? You can download it from:
